

## VIRTUAL SCHOOL SUPPLEMENTAL CONTRACT

### FAQs

**1. What is the maximum number of students I will have?**

There is no maximum, but we will work with teachers on this. If we do not have enough teachers to apply, we will have to continue the second semester the same as the first semester.

**2. How many face-to-face meetings would be required?**

There is a minimum of two face-to-face meetings per week, which will stay the same even if we go to a 4-1 or 5-0 model of blended instruction.

**3. Is there a minimum amount of time we must spend to fulfill the contract?**

This has always been up to the individual teachers. As the instructor, you will be responsible for teaching the essential content standards. Each teacher decides the amount of time necessary to accomplish this task.

**4. Can I work on this contract during my regular work day?**

You can use your planning period to work on this contract.

**5. Can we record during our blended learning classes for use as virtual instruction?**

Yes, but be careful not to video students in your classroom as this would be a FERPA violation.

**6. Would we need special permission from parents to do this?**

As long as you do not video the students you would not need permission.

**7. Would I be able to keep just the virtual students I have now?**

Yes. You will have a voice in how many students you take and which students you take.

**8. Will I have to teach subjects I'm not teaching now?**

No.

**9. Does this supplemental contract cover the work done for virtual students for the first semester?**

No. This contract is for the second semester only.

**10. What will happen if the county doesn't have enough teachers apply for the supplemental positions?**

We will have to continue as we have done during the first semester. When we move to a 4-1 or 5-0 blended learning model we will have to find ways to decrease the number of individuals in each classroom to 25 or less. One of the options being considered is to rotate students to other classrooms with less than 25 with their Chromebooks and earbuds to listen to lessons being taught in their classrooms.
